# From the Head

Last Friday we enjoyed an excellent assembly led by the Conservation Club, and I draw your attention to Mrs Wyatt's article here and her request for help with this year's whole school conservation targets!

"On Friday morning the Conservation Club presented to the whole school assembly. Although early into the new academic year, it was an excellent opportunity for them to outline the many initiatives they had worked on since their creation in 2018 and to set out their targets for the coming year. Over 20 girls from 5, 6 and 7J took part, sharing their achievements which included raising money to sponsor a Bottlenose dolphin from the Moray Firth by way of a very successful swap shop activity, to beginning a letter writing campaign to various Government departments, businesses and Aberdeen Council.

Within school there has been a noticeable reduction in the use of plastic resulting in a huge increase in the use of reusable water bottles. The club continues to collect Walkers crisps bags and during the summer over 1,500 empty packets were taken to a local collection centre to be recycled. This year the club is focusing on paper, not only in terms of reducing the amount used but setting the challenge of replenishing the raw materials - the trees - which we all take for granted. In the light of the terrible fires in the Arctic and Brazil, the club intends to promote new initiatives within the school and wider community to replace and restock our woodlands. It is a huge challenge but vitally important. On a small scale the club invited all the classes in school to remove paper towels, replacing them with cloths which can be washed and reused. On a larger scale, the club is keen to work with the wider community hoping to secure a piece of land, or allotment, where new saplings can be planted for future generations. We have already been invited to join an initiative involving the collecting and planting of acorns from the Crathes estate which we are very excited about.

If you think that you may be able to help us to meet these targets, the club would love to hear from you. The Woodland Trust is currently offering free trees to schools and communities - we would very much like to be a part of this. The best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The next best time is today (Chinese proverb)."



# Couldoor Learning

We then worked in pairs to find different textures to add to our palettes before doing some rubbings using chalk and wax crayon. #### Lego League City Shaper Challenge

Let the building commence! Last Wednesday saw the inaugural meeting of the St. Margaret's Lego League Club. First Lego League is an international competition organized by FIRST, for students aged 9 to 16 years. Each year First Lego League introduces a scientific, real-world challenge for teams to focus on, and research. The robotics part of the competition involves designing and programming Lego Mindstorms robots to complete tasks. The students work out solutions to the various problems they are given whilst being guided by the six FIRST core values: inclusion, discovery, innovation, impact, teamwork and fun.

The girls were all eager and ready to take part in the City Shaper Challenge. The girls were split into two teams and introduced to their ROVOP mentors, who will be guiding and offering technical knowledge to assist the girls during the design and making process. We are also grateful to ROVOP for sponsoring one of our kits.

This week saw our first opportunity to build the basic robot and to start building the Lego structures that will be used in the Challenge Mission. Focus and concentration was intense as all were actively involved. Some of the steps were quite tricky but we persevered. The 60 minutes sped by but we all were proud of what we had achieved.

We are all looking forward to our next meeting.

#### PTA MINUTES OF AGM AUGUST 26th

PRESENT: Head Teacher Miss Tomlinson, Bursar Mr Mountain, Deputy Head Mrs Lynch, Deputy Head (Learning & Teaching) Mrs Smith, Head of Juniors Mrs Murray, and Nursery Manager Miss Minett. Also in attendance were Chairwoman Tracey Almeida, Vice Chair and Acting Secretary Sally McDonald and Treasurer Henry Irvine-Fortescue.

#### CHAIRWOMAN'S REPORT:

Chair Tracey Almeida welcomed a super turn out of parents to the AGM and said she was delighted to see so many new faces which included a good number of dads. TA gave a brief explanation of the role of the PTA. She pointed out that it existed not only to raise funds (for those special 'extra' items not normally covered by the school budget) but also to organise fun events for both pupils, parents and staff, with the aim of enhancing the school community.

TA gave examples of the many and varied events held, from a sell-out afternoon cream tea, to a fish and chip quiz night, a fun film night and a Christmas extravaganza. She also spoke about the hugely popular and highly successful pre-loved book and uniform sales organised by Gillian Corry. It runs twice each year providing an invaluable service to parents and raising bumper funds for the PTA. Mrs Corry and her small army of helpers are to be commended for their hard work and dedication in delivering this service.

The chair also highlighted proposed new and exciting events for the coming year and encouraged all to keep a close eye on future announcements on both the PTA's Facebook page and in the school newsletter. She encouraged all parents new to the school to feel free to offer up ideas for future events.

TA concluded by adding that the PTA had had a bumper year, despite the challenges of being for a time without a secretary and treasurer and she paid tribute to those who had given their support throughout the year, both in the organisation and staffing of events, and to those who had enthusiastically attended and engaged in the spirit of the occasion.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT:

The PTA's new Treasurer, Henry Irvine-Fortescue, presented two years accounts for the years to 30 June 2018 and 2019. The income comes from the uniform and book sale, the Christmas hamper raffle, the quiz and fish and chips supper, Bags 2 School, sports day and Easy Fundraising initiative, along with relatively recent social events for parents and pupils like the spring afternoon tea and the movie night.

Net income after relevant expenses for the two years was £6,822 and £7,660 respectively which he said is a fantastic result. It has meant that additional items have been purchased for the school.

These include the refurbishment of the multi-purpose room, black-out blinds for the drama studio, classroom display screens, benches for the nursery kitchen, equipment for afterschool care and the holiday club, and a water fountain.

He advised both the Head Teacher and Bursar of cash now available for the purchase of additional items, and pledged, as with all other past expenditure, to make parents aware via the PTA Facebook and Web page and future school newsletters exactly what their donations, fundraising and support have brought to the school.

The accounts – which are now due to be audited – were formally adopted at the meeting.

#### **ELECTION OF OFFICE BEARERS:**

Nominations were received and seconded resulting in each of the existing office bearers continuing in their posts (TA Chair, SMcD Vice Chair, and HIF Treasurer).

A secretary is still required but SMcD – who is filling the role at present – advised that the task was neither too onerous nor time consuming, requiring attendance at only one meeting per term which involved handling the minutes. She stressed that full support would be given.

#### AOB:

St Margaret's Head of Development Rachel Paterson-Davies addressed the meeting to explain her role within the school's development department. She explained that she currently works with former parents, pupils and staff and would like to further enhance her links with the PTA to work more closely with both its members and parents. She encouraged all to "feel free" to go and speak with her and alerted the meeting to a future online event on the history of the school.

Comments from the floor included the importance of the role of Class Reps who are a vital link between the PTA and parents, disseminating information and rallying support for events. TA, SMcD, and HIF endorsed the comments, saying the PTA could not operate effectively without them.

The meeting was told that a calendar of events for the entire year was now being discussed with staff and, in response to parents' requests, would be circulated in the near future to afford them plenty of advance notice and an opportunity to make appropriate entries in their diaries.

#### CLOSE:

Head Teacher Miss Tomlinson thanked the PTA and its supporters for their efforts throughout the year.

Chair Tracey Almeida thanked all for attending the meeting.


