This week, the Advanced Higher Economics class attended an economics breakfast at the Royal Bank of Scotland's Corporate

Division at Marischal Square.



The bank's senior economist, Philip Bartlett, gave us an insight into the current topical economic issues being debated in the media; namely, inflation, government spending and taxation levels, real wages, low productivity, the Bank of England base rate, the possible consequences of an ageing population, and the divergent views on the future economic implications of AI on the labour market and wider economy.

Information surrounding these topics was given to us in a series of thought-provoking slides based on current economic data, and our students were also informed about the work of an economist and given advice on studying economics at university. A lively, and extensive, question and answer session brought the event to a close and we were very grateful for the time that Phil gave to our girls at the end of the presentation to discuss specific questions that they put forth to him regarding the future direction of the economy.






4 & 5 Junior Design & Make Project

The girls began their Thursday morning with a visit to the senior school artroom for their first specialist art lesson. They learned about textile design and how products that we use are made from different types of fabric. They also looked at how designers find their inspiration and use this to develop design ideas. They created a moodboard and selected yarn colours for a fabric that they will make.







I Senior - Introduction to the Visual Elements

The girls are building on their skill and knowledge of the Visual Elements colour, tone, line, texture, shape and pattern. They began by experimenting with different mark-making techniques and varied these to achieve different tones and textures. The girls were given sea shore themed objects to draw under timed conditions and they gradually built up a composition by layering them. They had the additional challenge of using a fine liner or a biro pen so that they couldn't rub out, encouraging them to build shapes gradually and purposefully whilst observing their subject.

In music with Mrs Magill they were learning about rhythm and using claves to copy rhythms and patterns.








With careful listening the children were developing their skills at balancing a ball on cones. Well done everyone!




