
The school will run Monday to Friday from 9:00am to 2:00pm and the cost of the week long course is £150. For further information please contact the school office.

## 6 Junior - Sheep's Heart Dissection

On Wednesday 8th of May, 6 Junior watched Biology teacher, Mrs Howitt dissecting a sheep's heart because we are studying the human body in our science class. We found out that a pig's heart is the closest animal heart to a human's. Once Mrs Howitt had cut open the heart, she showed us all of the different sections and where the arteries and veins attach. We were allowed to touch the heart ourselves as long as we scrubbed our hands really well afterwards and/or wore gloves. We saw the heart strings and valves inside the chambers. A few of us were talking with Mrs Howitt about any other dissections that she had done and she told us that she had recently dissected a pig's brain and was going to send us the photos.

Mrs. Howitt told us that one side of the heart had a thicker wall because it had to pump blood back all around the body and the other side was thinner because it only had to push the blood essentially next-door to the lungs. Did you know that your heart is roughly the size of your hand in a loose fist and your brain is about double that? We learnt a lot of different facts that we didn't know.

It was a very good experience and we now know that when we look at the diagrams in our textbooks we will know exactly what a heart looks like in real life.
