### **7J STEMovators**

Over the past few months 7 Junior have been working towards the STEMovators competition. This is a Scottish competition that encourages pupils from Primary 5 to S2 to explore Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths in creative and innovative ways.

7 Junior are taking part in the Climate Smarter section of the competition and have been involved in a series of work focusing on four key Climate Smarter topics: Renewable Energy, Water, Forestry, and Smart Technology. The final part of the project requires the pupils to work in teams to create a sustainable school of the future.

Monday the 12th of May was the culmination of all their work when parents and judges were invited into school to see all the hard work come together in a brilliant presentation of their learning. Our two judges, Mr Bamford and Miss Wilson, were amazed by the girls' presentation skills and the quality of the sustainable model schools they had created.

The judges had a very difficult job selecting the 2 winning groups against the STEMovators criteria.

However, after considering all the evidence, the judges selected the Eco Frogs and The Eco Champions of St. Megs as the two winning groups who will take their presentations to Aberdeen University on Tuesday 27th of May.

### **IIS Geography Field Trip**

**Aberdeen's Central Business District**

On Wednesday 14th May, the II Senior Geography pupils carried out fieldwork in various places around Aberdeen's CBD (Central Business District) and inner city. The girls visited 5 sites: the West end of Union Street, the middle section of Union Street, the East end of Union Street, the Green and Maberly Street. They also spent some time looking at the changes and improvements to the St Nicholas roof top garden and Union Terrace Gardens.

The girls carried out traffic and pedestrian counts and detailed environmental quality surveys. They also observed and recorded building features at each of the sites visited.



The purpose of this fieldwork was to equip pupils with information gathering skills. It also allowed them to collect information that they can use for their National 5 Geography Assignment. This assignment is carried out in exam conditions over a time period of 1 hour and is marked externally by the SQA. It makes up 20% of the final mark for National 5 Geography. The girls worked extremely hard and gathered detailed and accurate information at all the sites.

#### **IIIS Peterhead Prison Museum Visit**

Our Modern Studies III Senior class recently enjoyed a visit to the Peterhead Prison Museum. It was a lovely day, and the pupils found the experience both interesting and eye-opening. They learned a lot about the history of the prison, the daily lives of the prisoners, and how the justice system has changed over time. Walking through the old cells and hearing real stories from the past helped bring their classroom learning to life.

The visit tied in really well with their coursework, especially around crime and the justice system. It gave the pupils a chance to think more deeply about the impact crime can have—not just on those who commit it, but also on their families and wider society. Everyone came away with a better understanding of these important issues, and it was a valuable day all round.





#### **Summary**

This week, Nandi shares her childhood wish for a younger sister after experiencing the chaos of having two energetic younger brothers. Despite the noise and constant sports, they grow to appreciate the love and support their family provides.

Tied to the International Day of Families (May 15), the piece highlights the importance of family bonds, especially during hard times. It references UN child rights articles that stress keeping families together and ensuring children are well cared for, even in alternative living situations.

The text also looks at family poverty, especially in the UK and developing regions, and its effects on both children and parents.

Nandi concludes by reflecting on the fact that while families can be messy and difficult, they are also a source of comfort and unconditional love — and should be celebrated.
