### Mindfulness Classes for Teenagers





This task fitted perfectly with our maths topic. We had been looking at multiplication and our times table facts. We started by separating the packs into equal amounts. We had singles, packs of 3, packs of 4, packs of 5, packs of 7 and packs of 10. We then set about totalling how many were in each pile. We had 12 singles, 5 packs of 3, 34 packs of 4, 23 packs of 5, 7 packs of 8 and 24 packs of 10. Of course, as you have calculated this came to the grand total of 574 pairs of pants. WOW! We have begun a unit on bridges, and are learning about compression and tension forces. So far the girls have looked at beam and truss bridges. They have worked with straws to improve the strength of a thin card beam bridge. Straws have been used to make trusses which distribute the force on the bridge and strengthen the deck. We have tested the bridges to see how much weight they can take before collapsing. The variety of bridge structure shows a great level of creativity from the girls as they have applied their knowledge from the unit.

Later in the unit the girls will have the opportunity to construct a suspension bridge using a variety of materials.
