
#### Les Misérables School Edition

## **Biology Week**

What is a bee? A crucial pollinator which can deliver a sting in peril? Or a reflection of the bees' social structure, where all individuals gather together to achieve a task, such as in the Great British Sewing Bee? Words can be tricksy things, and add to the challenge of learning a new subject. Biology words can feel like a whole other level, with their roots in Latin and Greek making the simple feel more complex. A reading age analysis of any biology exam will show you that this vocabulary can add years of difficulty to the text. Our challenge as teachers is to unlock decoding skills so that our girls can establish the meanings of new terminology easily.

Before the holidays, we embarked on our second year of participating in the Royal Society of Biology's Biology Spelling Bee, as part of Biology Week. Whilst recognising that spelling ability is by no means an accurate reflection on anyone's ability to become a very successful scientist, this fun competition gave us a chance to practise spellings in a way which is perhaps not routine. From our 100-word list, there were science-related homophones for everyday words (discrete vs discreet, beech vs beach), homonyms (serial, matrix) and a compound word which means dispersing seeds through animals (endozoochory) which was even unfamiliar to staff. Engaging with unfamiliar words in this way will help us with reading comprehension and literacy, expanding our vocabulary and understanding of word roots.

All biology classes participated in the first round in class, writing out 20 agerelated words called out by their teacher. As appropriate to a Bee, there was a
great Buzz in the classrooms where a love of learning was evident. We hope that
by participating all girls had the opportunity to boost their confidence and build
their resilience and sportsmanship. Each year group had a winner selected from
the first round, who participated orally in the School Final - how many words can
you spell correctly in two minutes? Each finalist did an incredible job, boosted by
the moral support of their the hive and maintained amazing focus and composure.
Results have been submitted to the National Final to see how we compare against
others in the same age categories, and we await news of who the Queens might
be.

# Article of the Week Qi Qi He (IVM)



Article 24 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child connects closely to National Pasta Month.
