HAVING A CONVERSATION WITH YOUR CHILD

Starting the conversation:

Find a good time and place. Try to choose a good moment. Pick an opportunity when you know you're not going to be interrupted and you are both going to feel comfortable and have enough time – without turning it into one of those 'special talks' moments.

Think about how you are going to introduce the subject. You could mention a recent news story or just explain why you would like to talk to them about something. Try to be clear. It's no good having a difficult conversation if at the end of it they don't really understand what you wanted to talk to them about.

Explain to them why you are worried. Your child might think that you are getting worried for no good reason, but if you explain why something is troubling you they will understand why you want to talk to them. Tell them if it is something you've noticed in their behaviour or maybe something you have read about or seen their friends doing. Help them to understand your worries so that together you can work them out.

Let them talk. It's hard sometimes when a child doesn't want to open up. Asking them a question like 'how are things going' and remembering to give them time to answer will help. It's tempting to keep talking at them to fill the space – try not to.

Listen more than you talk. A conversation has to have two people in it. It's important you listen to them and that you explain you'd like them to listen to you. Talking at them is never going to work.

Be loving and supportive. The most difficult conversations can be made easier if your child understands that you care about them and whatever the outcome you will love them just as much.

If your child tells you something that worries you:

Take a break. If your child is telling you things that worry you it is really important to stay calm and not to react immediately. Let them tell you what's going on and then decide together how you're going to deal with it.

Get help together. If your child tells you something which means they could be in danger you must report this to the relevant organisations. Try to agree to do this together. Don't take over unless you think that is your only option.

Get support for yourself. Your focus is going to be on looking after your child but remember to look after yourself as well and get support from your family and friends. What if your child doesn't want to talk?

If your child doesn't want to talk to you and you are still really worried don't give up. Try again another time or find a different way to start the conversation. Be patient and make sure they know where they can go themselves for support on difficult issues. You might want to talk to their teacher to see if they share your concerns – whatever you decide be ready when your child decides they want to talk to you.

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St Margaret's Day Service at St Machar's Cathedral


This morning school will hold its annual St Margaret's Day Service in the ancient St Machar Cathedral. The flat oak ceiling, which dates back to 1520, is decorated with heraldic shields representing the monarchies of Europe, and includes St Margaret of Scotland.

The cathedral attracts 25,000 visitors a year and if you can't visit it in person you can take one of their virtual tours and see if you can find St Margaret's shield:

The Cathedral has launched a fundraising campaign, Raise the Roof, to help raise £350,000 to meet the £1.85 million target to complete the required roof repairs and protect the ceiling. For £10, supporters can buy a slate and the names of all those who have donated will be written on a scroll and placed in a time capsule within the roof. St Margaret's Annual Fund 2019 - 2020

Earlier in the autumn term the school launched its second annual fund appeal. More information about the appeal can be found on our webpages (https://stmargaretsconnect.com/#annualfund2019/20) but it may be useful to have a bit more context around why the school is making this appeal.

What is the annual fund?

The annual fund is an appeal to our community to support the school's bursary programme, providing means-tested transformational bursaries. The annual fund will run for this academic year.

Why is this appeal needed?

As a charity regulated by OSCR the school must, and does, provide means-tested bursaries. These are funded by careful management of school finances together with gifts from donors.

Demand for bursary support, however, exceeds what the school can provide. We are reaching out to ask for your support in helping us offer the opportunity for a St Margaret's education to girls from our community.

How will your donation be used?

Your donation will be used to support the St Margaret's Fund which will provide transformational means-tested bursaries, unless you wish your support to be directed towards other school initiatives.

How will you know if your gift has had a positive impact?

We will update all donors on the progress of the annual fund appeal. For reasons of confidentiality we cannot disclose the recipients of awards but we will update supporters with information around the bursaries awarded as a result of the appeal.

What other fundraising activities is the school involved in?

Our school and pupils benefit from a dedicated group of donors who have supported bursaries, music and pupil clubs to name a few initiatives. Occasionally gifts are unexpected but other donors prefer to make a longer and planned commitment and it is fantastic to have all their support.

The school are actively engaged in applying to trusts and foundations for support for the bursary programme and this work is a priority for the Development Office.

And of course, the PTA have been tremendous fundraising champions for the school with their activities throughout the year, helping to fund projects from nursery through to senior school.

What value of gifts is the school expecting?

Every gift, no matter the size, will make a difference to our bursary fund. Whether you chose to give a single gift or a recurring gift, £5 or £100, all of your donation will be used to support the pupils who benefit from St Margaret's Fund.

Visit to Belmont Cinema - French Film
