Searking Near School

The safety of our girls and others is of paramount importance, so we need to draw parents' attention to recent complaints about hazardous parking in the vicinity of the school. City Council wardens have also asked us to remind parents to park in a safe place on public roads when dropping off and collecting children, and not on double yellow lines - where parking may result in a fine. It is also a danger to other road users and pedestrians and it causes congestion, particularly on the short stretch of Rubislaw Terrace opposite the school. Cars should otherwise park at the side of the road when dropping off or collecting children, who should always get in and out on the pavement side.




A post-Hallowe'en zombie apocalypse hit the biology department on Thursday.

One unsuspecting Advanced Higher pupil had caught a zombie virus and it rapidly spread through the class. We performed ELISA experiments (enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay) using our knowledge of protein-antibody interactions to diagnose who the infected pupils were, then traced back who they had encountered during the lesson to try to surmise the source of the outbreak. This simulated an epidemiology investigation into the source of disease outbreaks, and will feed into our work on parasitology and immunology later in the course.
